MEDITATIONS

“Hear.... But My people would not hearken to My voice.”

Psalm 81: 8a, 11a

“Open,” saith the Lord

“Wide thy mouth, believing

This My covenant word:

‘I will, if thou plead,

Fill thine every need,

All thy wants relieving” Psalter 431:4

How touching the 81st psalm is, for it contains the loving chastisement of a deeply offended Father. The people to whom the

Lord spoke were not strangers. They were His people, whom He had sovereignly chosen. He had liberated and led Israel in a wondrous manner (v. 5-7). But what had this covenant people done? They had quarreled and murmured! And what did the Lord do? Did He turn away? On the contrary, He lovingly stooped to His people and said, “Hear!” The Lord warned them of their unholy ways and strange gods. At the same time the Lord kindly invited them to look only unto Him, because He was able and willing richly to grant them all things.

In the midst of the restless time in which we live our busy lives, we are called upon to stand still and reflect. How have you lived your life? Ask yourself before God. What has the Lord done for you, and what have you been in the Lord's sight? Are your deeds better than those of the people of Israel? Yet the Lord says, “If thou wilt hearken unto Me” (v. 8b). The Lord is worthy of it. It is His just due. The idols we worship are our ruin. Not one of them can help or save us. But with the Lord all things are possible. He is able and willing to supply all our temporal and spiritual needs.

Did Israel respond to this loving invitation? Do we respond to it? Many think they do: God is willing and I am willing too. But God's word teaches us differently. “But My people would not hearken to My voice.” The invitation was refused!

This is not said of the world, but of “My people.” Who are they? They are those who are in an outward covenant relationship with the Lord. All God's living people, who must by grace learn their true condition, are also included. In our text our state is described as disobedient and unwilling.

We prefer to talk about our helplessness, but God is speaking here of our guilty unwillingness. Through the fall we have become great fools and enemies of God and our own salvation. All would be lost, were it not for the provision in the covenant of grace of One who is willing to hear and obey (Psalm 40:8,9). Christ bowed willingly under God's demands, and He did it for the unwilling, that they might be made willing through the Spirit. Then it is fulfilled, I will and they shall. Then ears are opened and hearts are humbled in obedience.

But if warnings have no effect, God becomes silent and leaves us to our own sinful lusts. The worst judgement is when God is silent and when it seems as though He does not see wickedness. Then destruction is near at hand! As long as God still punishes us with His deeds and His word, as long as He still inspires fear with His judgements, and as long as He still condescends in His longsuffering, it is still a time of mercy.

Congregation, I greet you heartily with the Lord's invitation, “Open thy mouth wide, and I will fill it.”
